DAY 19: 6th SEPTEMBER 2025

ENERGY AND GOVERNANCE IN UGANDA:

Powering a Nation with Justice and Stewardship

GENESIS 1:16-18

And God made the two great lights—the greater light to rule the day and the lesser light to rule the night—and the stars. And God set them in the expanse of the heavens to give light on the earth, to rule over the day and over the night, and to separate the light from the darkness. And God saw that it was good.

PSALM 97:4

His lightnings light up the world; the earth sees and trembles.

REVELATION 4:5

From the throne came flashes of lightning, and rumblings and peals of thunder, and before the throne were burning seven torches of fire, which are the seven spirits of God..

INTRODUCTION

Energy is one of the engines of national development. It lights homes, powers industries, drives education and healthcare, and connects communities. Without reliable and affordable energy, a nation cannot achieve sustainable growth. In Uganda, the energy sector is both a blessing and a challenge. Blessed with vast potential — hydroelectric power from the Nile, oil and gas reserves, solar radiation, biomass, and wind — Uganda has the resources to meet its people's needs. Yet governance determines whether these resources become a channel of prosperity for all or a source of corruption, inequality, and environmental harm.

Isaiah 60:19 — “The sun will no more be your light by day, nor will the brightness of the moon shine on you, for the Lord will be your everlasting light.” Energy — whether from sun, water, or fuel — points us to God as the true source of light.

1. Energy as a Driver of Development

Uganda's Vision 2040 identifies energy as a foundation for industrialization and modern society. Electricity enables schools, hospitals, and businesses to function effectively. Yet access remains low. Uganda's electricity infrastructure is concentrated in urban areas, leaving rural communities – where more than three-fourths of the population live – with limited access to dependable electricity. As of 2023, access to electricity was about 51.5% of Ugandans with most connections located in urban areas. This urban-rural gap in electricity access is a significant obstacle to economic development, the provision of social services, and the overall quality of life in rural regions. Only about 60% of Ugandans are connected to electricity, and many rural communities still rely on firewood and charcoal. Governance decisions about grid expansion, rural electrification, and renewable energy are crucial.

Matthew 5:14 — “You are the light of the world.” Just as believers bring spiritual light, governments are called to bring physical light through fair and inclusive energy policies.

2. Oil and Gas: Blessing or Curse?

The discovery of oil in the Albertine region has been hailed as a potential game-changer. If managed well, it could fund infrastructure and social services. But if mismanaged, it could fuel corruption, environmental damage, and inequality. Good governance requires transparency in contracts, accountability in revenue management, and protection of local communities.

Proverbs 13:11 — “Dishonest money dwindles away, but whoever gathers money little by little makes it grow.” Oil wealth gained through corruption will vanish; only honesty and stewardship build prosperity.

3. Hydropower and Renewable Energy

Uganda relies heavily on hydroelectric dams along the Nile (e.g., Nalubaale, Karuma, Isimba). While these generate most of Uganda's electricity, they are vulnerable to climate shocks, droughts, and ecosystem disruption. Governance must diversify energy investments into solar, wind, and biomass. Uganda has abundant sunshine that could power villages and schools through decentralized solar systems.

Genesis 1:16–18 — God made the sun and moon “to give light on the earth.” Harnessing renewable energy honors God's creation when done sustainably.

4. Energy, Equity, and Social Justice

Energy access is a justice issue. Urban areas enjoy electricity, while many rural families live in darkness. Women and children spend hours collecting firewood, leading to deforestation and health problems from indoor smoke. Righteous governance must close this energy gap to ensure that light and power are not luxuries, but rights.

John 8:12 — “I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will never walk in darkness.” God's justice means no community should be left in darkness.

5. Corruption, Accountability, and Stewardship

The energy sector is vulnerable to inflated contracts, ghost projects, and political favoritism. Corruption delays projects, raises costs, and denies citizens reliable services.

Strong governance requires transparency in procurement, monitoring, and community participation.

Proverbs 29:4 — “By justice a king gives a country stability, but those who are greedy for bribes tear it down.”

6. Energy and the Environment

Energy development often threatens ecosystems: dams alter river flows, oil drilling endangers wildlife, charcoal burning destroys forests. Governance must ensure environmental impact assessments, compensation for affected communities, and investments in green energy.

Revelation 11:18 — God will “destroy those who destroy the earth.” Energy governance is a moral responsibility to balance progress with preservation.

Conclusion

The energy sector in Uganda is a test of governance. Will leaders manage oil, hydro, and renewables with justice, transparency, and sustainability? Or will corruption, inequality, and neglect keep communities in darkness? Energy is not just about power plants and oil wells; it is about justice, stewardship, and the future of generations.

Proverbs 14:34 — “Righteousness exalts a nation, but sin condemns any people.” Only righteous governance will exalt Uganda through energy.

Lord, grant wisdom to Uganda’s leaders to manage oil revenues, build reliable power systems, and prioritize renewables. Give them courage to resist corruption and favoritism.

4. Prayer for Equitable Access

John 1:5 — “The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it.”

Lord, we pray that no village, no school, no clinic in Uganda will remain in darkness. Provide affordable, reliable, and clean energy for every family.

5. Prayer Against Corruption

Isaiah 10:1–2 — “Woe to those who make unjust laws... to deprive the poor of their rights.”

Lord, expose and uproot corruption in the energy sector. Protect resources from theft and misuse. Let justice and accountability govern contracts and revenues.

6. Prayer for Environmental Stewardship

Genesis 2:15 — “The Lord God took the man and put him in the Garden of Eden to work it and take care of it.”

Lord, help Uganda balance energy development with care for creation. Protect forests, wetlands, rivers, and wildlife from exploitation. Inspire green, sustainable energy solutions.

7. Prayer for Uganda’s Future

Isaiah 60:1 — “Arise, shine, for your light has come, and the glory of the Lord rises upon you.”

Lord, may Uganda shine as a nation where energy is managed with justice, where homes are lit, industries thrive, and communities prosper. May energy governance exalt Uganda and glorify Your name.
