#### **NATIONAL DISCIPLINE**

#### **PROVERBS 25:28**

Like a city whose walls are broken through is a person who lacks self-control.

## **PROVERBS 29:4**

By justice a king gives a country stability, but those who are greedy for bribes tear it down."

#### **HEBREWS 12:11**

No discipline seems pleasant at the time, but painful. Later on, however, it produces a harvest of righteousness and peace for those who have been trained by it."

Discipline is the backbone of any nation. Governance depends on discipline because it ensures that rules, policies, and values are upheld. A disciplined government enforces laws fairly, resists corruption, and models accountability. Disciplined citizens pay taxes, follow laws, and work hard to build the nation. Where discipline thrives, there is stability, trust, and progress.

Without it, governance falters, institutions weaken, and citizens lose confidence in the state. For Uganda, discipline is not just about personal conduct but about how citizens, leaders, and institutions align their actions with national values, laws, and responsibilities.

Indiscipline and Its Impact on Governance in Uganda

Discipline is the backbone of any nation. It is what shapes how resources are managed, how laws are respected, and how citizens live together in harmony. When discipline is upheld, governance thrives: institutions gain strength, services reach citizens, and trust is built between leaders and the governed. But when indiscipline spreads, corruption flourishes, lawlessness takes root, and development stalls. Uganda today faces serious challenges of indiscipline that weaken governance and frustrate national progress. The Bible reminds us in Proverbs 25:28: "Like a city whose walls are broken through is a person who lacks self-control." A nation without discipline is like a city without walls—exposed, unstable and vulnerable to collapse.

#### SOME AREAS OF NATIONAL INDISCIPLINE IN UGANDA TODAY

## 1. Corruption and Misuse of Public Office

Corruption has become one of the most destructive forms of indiscipline in Uganda. Public resources meant to serve the people often disappear into private pockets. A striking example was the 2012 Office of the Prime Minister scandal, where over fifty billion shillings intended for Northern Uganda's post-war recovery were stolen. Instead of rebuilding lives, the money enriched a few individuals. Such acts erode public trust, cripple service delivery, and leave citizens disillusioned. As *Proverbs 29:4* warns, "By justice a king gives a country stability, but those who are greedy for bribes tear it down."

## 2. Lawlessness and Impunity

Another form of indiscipline lies in the widespread culture of impunity. Though Uganda has laws, they are often applied selectively, with the powerful escaping justice. Illegal land evictions in districts like Mubende and Kayunga are examples where entire communities have been displaced without due process or fair compensation, often under the protection of corrupt officials. Families lose livelihoods, resentment grows, and governance loses its legitimacy. Lawlessness in high places eventually trickles down into everyday life, spreading the sense that rules can be bent or ignored.

## 3. Poor Work Ethic and Laziness

Uganda's progress is also undermined by indiscipline in the workplace. In many public offices, lateness, absenteeism, and poor service delivery are routine. The Inspector General of Government's 2019 report highlighted chronic absenteeism among civil servants, especially in health and education. In some rural hospitals, patients arrive only to find no medical staff available. This form of indiscipline not only wastes public resources but also costs lives. *Proverbs 14:23* reminds us: "All hard work brings a profit, but mere talk leads only to poverty." A nation cannot advance when its workforce shirks responsibility.

## 4. Tax Evasion and Resource Mismanagement

Tax discipline is vital for national development, yet Uganda loses significant revenue through evasion and mismanagement. The informal sector, which contributes more than half of the economy, often operates outside the tax net. Meanwhile, even the revenues that are collected are sometimes wasted through inflated contracts and procurement scandals. Without financial discipline, infrastructure projects stall, schools lack supplies, and hospitals run short of medicine. Citizens are left underserved, and trust in government weakens further.

## 5. Indiscipline in Politics



Uganda's politics are often marked by division, manipulation, and violence. Instead of building consensus, elections frequently descend into conflict. During the 2021 general elections, for instance, reports of voter bribery, intimidation, and violent clashes were widespread. Such behavior undermines democracy, deepens divisions, and weakens the credibility of governance. Political indiscipline not only erodes trust but also diverts the nation's focus from development to endless conflict.

## 6. Social Indiscipline

Indiscipline also shows itself in society through moral decay and lack of self-control. Uganda ranks among the highest consumers of alcohol in Africa, fueling domestic violence and accidents. Gender-based violence remains widespread, with over one in three women experiencing abuse. In schools, examination malpractice has become so common that UNEB has had to cancel results in some centers, exposing students and even teachers involved in cheating. These behaviors corrode families, weaken institutions, and undermine the moral fiber of the nation. As *Proverbs 25:28* reminds us, without self-control, a society becomes defenseless against decay.

## 7. Indiscipline in Traffic

Kampala's traffic chaos is one of the most visible signs of indiscipline in Uganda. Roads meant to carry vehicles in order are often turned into arenas of chaos. Drivers overlap, boda boda riders zigzag dangerously, and traffic officers simply watch and are frequently bribed to ignore offenses. According to the Uganda Police's 2022 Traffic Report, more than 20,000 road accidents were recorded, many due to reckless driving. Lives are lost daily, productivity is slowed, and the culture of breaking rules becomes normalized. *Ecclesiastes 10:8* cautions that, "Whoever breaks through a wall may be bitten by a snake." Breaking traffic rules, as Uganda's statistics show, carries deadly consequences.

#### 8. Indiscipline in Queues

Even in simple daily routines, indiscipline is evident. In hospitals, banks, and taxi stages, queues are often ignored. People push ahead, use connections, or pay bribes to be served first. At Mulago Hospital, reports frequently highlight patients bribing staff to jump the line, leaving others frustrated and untreated. Such behavior may appear small, but it reveals a lack of respect for fairness and order. It is in these "small" acts of indiscipline that the larger culture of corruption and lawlessness finds fertile ground.

#### The Cost of Indiscipline

The collective effect of corruption, impunity, poor work ethic, tax evasion, political violence, moral decay, traffic chaos, and disregard for order in daily life is devastating. It undermines trust, erodes institutions, and stalls development. When indiscipline reigns, mistrust replaces cooperation, shortcuts replace diligence, and chaos replaces harmony. Yet there is hope. As Hebrews 12:11 reminds us, "No discipline seems pleasant at the time, but painful. Later on, however, it produces a harvest of righteousness and peace for those who have been trained by it."

For Uganda to flourish, discipline must be embraced—not just by leaders in high offices, but by ordinary citizens in queues, on the roads, in workplaces, and in homes. Discipline is not only about order; it is about righteousness, justice, and accountability. Without it, no nation can prosper.

## The Role of Governance in Restoring Discipline

Governance plays a major role in the shaping of discipline within society. This begins with leading by example, where leaders model integrity, accountability, and service. It continues through strengthening institutions—ensuring that courts, the police, and anti-corruption bodies act firmly and impartially. Discipline is also nurtured by building a culture of accountability, where citizens are held responsible for their actions, from paying taxes to obeying the law. Finally, governance must invest in promoting civic education, teaching citizens their values, rights, and responsibilities in order to cultivate disciplined behavior.

Discipline, therefore is essential for Uganda's peace, prosperity, and national transformation.
