ECCLESIASTES 3:1, 4

Governance is often measured by constitutions, laws, and infrastructure. Yet a deeper measure of governance lies in the spirit and morale of a people, expressed in their ability to celebrate, rejoice, and give thanks.

Today, 9th October - Uganda's Independence Day, we commemorate our political freedom. It is Uganda's birthday as a nation, a divine moment to reflect on how God has preserved the country since 1962 and to look forward with gratitude and hope. The



independence celebration is deeply biblical. It commemorates the day the nation of Uganda officially began to function as an independent nation.

The biblical nation of Israel began to exist as a separate entity at the time of Passover and God commanded them to commemorate that event. Throughout Scripture, God commands His people to remember, celebrate, and rejoice before Him - because celebration renews identity, strengthens unity, and exalts God's works.

THE BIBLICAL FOUNDATION OF CELEBRATION

1. God as the Author of Joy

The psalmist declares, "In His presence is fullness of joy; at His right hand are pleasures forevermore" (Psalm 16:11). Joy and celebration are not human inventions but divine gifts. God created humanity with the capacity for delight, laughter, dance, and feasting as reflections of His own nature. In the Old Testament, He commanded Israel to mark their lives with festivals, music, and dance (Leviticus 23). These were not optional diversions but sacred appointments where the people gathered to remember His works, give thanks, and rejoice in His presence.

Uganda's rich musical, cultural, and festival traditions find their truest expression when they flow from this divine source. When Ugandans celebrate Independence Day on 9th October, it is an opportunity to acknowledge that freedom itself is a gift from God, who is the fountain of joy.

2. Celebration as Identity and Memory

Celebration is also about shaping national identity and preserving memory. For Israel, the Feast of Passover served as an annual reminder of God's deliverance from slavery in Egypt. It was a covenant marker that defined them as God's redeemed people. God used their national Passover meal to set the stage for the future deliverance of mankind from satanic bondage; this was fulfilled by Christ Himself centuries later.

Likewise, Uganda's Independence Day functions as a national Passover of sorts. It reminds citizens that in 1962, God granted deliverance from colonial rule and entrusted the nation with the responsibility of self-governance. Each year on 9th October, Ugandans are called not just to enjoy parades and music but to renew their covenant with God, recognizing Him as the one who secures freedom and directs the destiny of nations. Forgetting such milestones risks losing the moral compass of governance; remembering them renews identity and hope.

3. Celebration as Unity

True celebration is a unifier. In Nehemiah 8, when Ezra read the law to the people, they wept at first because they realized how far they had strayed from God. But Nehemiah urged them not to grieve: "Go and enjoy choice food and sweet drinks, and send some to those who have nothing prepared. This day is holy to our Lord" (Nehemiah 8:10). The result was a communal feast marked by joy, generosity, and shared purpose.

In Uganda, celebrations such as Independence Day play a similar role. They cut across tribal, regional, and political divides to foster unity. As Baganda, Banyankole, Acholi, Iteso, and all of Uganda's peoples celebrate together, the nation finds strength in shared identity. In a context where tribalism and political rivalry often divide, national celebrations provide a reminder that Uganda is one people under God.

4. Celebration as Witness

Celebration is also a witness to God's presence in national life. When David brought the Ark of the Covenant back to Jerusalem, he danced before the Lord with all his might (2 Samuel 6:14). His public celebration was a declaration that the throne of Israel would not rest on human strength but on God's presence.

Similarly, Uganda's national celebrations can serve as testimonies. Independence Day is not only a civic holiday but also an opportunity for the nation to declare that its future does not lie in politics alone, but in the hands of the Almighty. When Ugandans dance, sing, and rejoice under one flag, it is a prophetic witness that God is the one holding the nation together. Such witness is powerful both internally - inspiring unity and hope - and externally, as Uganda projects its identity to the world as a people whose joy flows from God.

UGANDA'S HERITAGE OF CELEBRATION AND ENTERTAINMENT

Music and Dance

Music and dance are central to Uganda's culture. From Kadongo Kamu to gospel festivals, from the Baakisiimba of Buganda to the Larakaraka of Acholi, music and dance are both expressions of joy and vehicles for identity.

Sports as National Celebration

Sports unify Uganda in ways few things can. The Uganda Cranes ignite collective patriotism, and athletes like Joshua Cheptegei carry the national flag to global recognition. These victories echo Paul's words:

1 Corinthians 9:24 - "Do you not know that in a race all the runners run, but only one gets the prize? Run in such a way as to get the prize."

Arts, Theatre, and Film

Theatre, poetry, film, and comedy in Uganda showcase creativity. These echo the biblical truth that God filled Bezalel and Oholiab with artistic skill for His glory (Exodus 35:30–35). Governance must therefore protect intellectual property and nurture this space as part of Uganda's redemptive creativity.

Food and Feasting

Every celebration in Uganda features food - *matooke, kwon, binyebwa, luwombo, rolex, etc.* - as symbols of fellowship. This mirrors Isaiah's vision:

Isaiah 25:6 - "On this mountain the Lord Almighty will prepare a feast of rich food for all peoples."

Conclusion

Uganda's celebrations - whether through music, dance, sports, festivals, or feasting - are not trivial amusements but expressions of national unity, biblical joy, cultural preservation, and governance in action. When guided by righteousness, they strengthen identity, heal divisions, and glorify God. Celebration is therefore not trivial; it is sacred, formative, and prophetic. It acknowledges God as the giver of joy, preserves memory of His mighty acts, unites citizens around shared truth, and testifies that He reigns over the nation. On this 9th October, Uganda's Independence Day, the call is not only to celebrate freedom but also to root that celebration in biblical truth.
